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

Why activism is important to help Indigenous peoples and the environment.

In June 2023, the Sinchi Foundation launched a major new initiative with an emphasis on Indigenous people's rights, dovetailing with justice, technology, the environment, and sustainability.

Many hours have been spent in the background by the team to bring together global influencers and professionals in environmental, social and governance affairs to attract the attention of businesses, NGOs and governments worldwide.

The ambitious campaign – called Treesistance – is nothing less than a mission to transform how the world looks at forest crime prevention and handles environmental preservation.

Access to justice model

Underpinning Treesistance is a forest guardians' model. The objective to provide the tools and resources to the local Indigenous communities, so they can effectively defend the forest and carry out their role as the custodians for one of the planet's most important ecosystems.

The forest guardians model starts with a demarcation plan. This involves drawing clear lines of where the Indigenous territories are and making the necessary land claims.

Once these demarcations have been created groups of forest guardians will carry out patrols and surveillance within the communities. This identifies and halts illegal activity and deforestation caused by loggers, soy farmers, mining companies and cattle ranchers that are illegally invading their territories. Importantly, evidence gathered on larger scale operations needs to reach public prosecutors and the Federal Police to ensure appropriate action is taken.

The members of the communities taking part comprise everyone from the chiefs and teachers to doctors – these guardians will take turns patrolling the area using GPS cameras.

At the moment there are forest guardians active in three territories that represents 710 km² in the Amazon. The idea is to scale this up and six new forest guardian teams will be created in 2023, which will bring more than 1500 km² under protection.

It's a model that is expandable, proven (featured in the last UN module on Forest & Fauna) and can be replicated globally. The aim is to start with Brazil and build out in the Amazon before expanding to other tropical forests in Africa and Asia. It's a simple but disruptive idea that will help to change the existing systems by giving power back to the communities on the ground.

To help make all this happen the Sinchi Foundation recently appointed Dr Tim Boekhout van Solinge as Head of Forest Crime Prevention. Tim's role will be to lead 'on the ground' actions and activities relating to coordinating access to justice strategies with Indigenous leaders and law enforcement. His background is criminology and he's a UN author specialising in forest and wildlife crime, organised crime and community-based forest crime prevention.

Each new group of Forest Guardians in 2023 will be sponsored by an IR member firm.

This Treesistance access to justice model will be supported by three other strategic pillars:


- Digital Equity Project Amazon Connect.
- Renewable Energy Transition Project Green Natives.
- Sustainable Economic Development Project Indigenous Equity.

Digital Equity

Access to justice is linked with digital connectivity and technology. For the campaign to work, the forest guardians need to be able to send information in real time. Therefore, it's critical to have access to good communications networks.

The communities take pictures with GPS coordinates to document illegal activity – these coordinates are needed by the authorities to prove illegality and to take appropriate action to remove such operations.

In addition, the introduction of the internet will also have a positive impact on both the healthcare and education sectors, to further support the most vulnerable, the young and the future of their people.



Renewable Energy Transition

Currently, there is a reliance on fossil fuels powering boats and other transport in the Amazon. Travelling over huge distances is expensive. The deeper one travels into the jungle, the more difficult and expensive everything becomes. This leads to abuse including the sexual exploitation of women in the region and locks people into a cycle of poverty. Often Indigenous peoples living in such remote locations spend most of their spare funds on logistics, travelling from A to B. Solving these financial challenges is essential in combatting inequality.


Sustainable Economic Development

For the team at Sinchi, this is possibly the most important long-term factor. The campaign must show to Indigenous and non-indigenous peoples that the forest is worth more standing than it is felled. With sustainable development, communities will be able to thrive and dedicate more time to preservation and regeneration.

"Everything is interconnected"

According to Tom Wheeler, the four elements must be considered as one: "If one is achieved but not another, there could be good short-term results, but it will ultimately fall down. Everything is interconnected.

"The Treesistance campaign is an active and optimistic refusal to comply with a system that exploits nature. It's focused on the protection of the rain forest through prevention, on community building and storytelling. These stories are essential if the word is going to get out beyond the forest and into the wider world."







June 2023 The Launch

The launch in June 2023 of the Treesistance (incidentally, World Rainforest Day) was streamed online to a global audience.

The intentions of the organisation are to now build upon their impressive foundations and bring in new partners who share their vision, so their actions and message, can be amplified.

Expect to see in the coming year, film releases, branded apparel, media and creative collaborations.

Partners already include CAKE, a company that is developing the world's first zero emission motorbike, Pubity Group Media Publishing – owner of the world's largest Gen Z and Millennial social media platforms – and Marcio Silva, one of the world's more renowned mixologists who has created a special cocktail to raise funds and visibility for the Treesistance.
